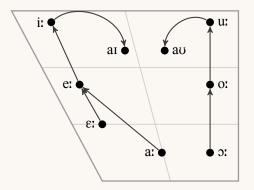

#### Language Change

- Languages change over time
- ► How?
  - Phonetics/Phonology (sound changes)
  - Morphology (case paradigm creation/leveling)
  - Syntax (word order changes)
  - Semantics (meaning change)
  - Lexicon (word changes)
- Generally, a regular process

#### Sound Changes (GVS)

Great Vowel Shift (English, c. 1400-1600)



#### Sound Changes (GVS)

- ▶ 'meet'  $[me:t] \rightarrow [mi:t]$

- ► 'house' [hu:sə]  $\rightarrow$  [haus]

#### Syntax Changes

#### Consider these lines from Shakespeare:

- (1) a. He loves not you.
  - b. He does not love you.

[Lysander, MSND III.ii]

- (2) a. Wrong I mine enemies?
  - b. Do I wrong my enemies?

[Brutus, JC IV.ii]

- (3) a. Knows he not thy voice?
  - b. Does he not know your voice?

[First Lord, AWTEW IV.i]

- No do-support
- Inverted order of negation and lexical verb
- Inverted order of lexical verb and negation in Qs

#### Semantic Changes

#### **Lexical Changes**

- Loans/borrowings may coin new words or displace existing ones:
  - Arabic: admiral, albatross, alcohol, algebra, average, Betelgeuse
  - Etruscan: autumn (?) person, people (?)
- Less 'regular' than, e.g., sound change, but usually follows general patterns
  - Motivated by domains of use (inventions, skills, etc)
  - Often has social/identity components (Norman stratum in law/high cuisine)
